

She discusses the numerous challenges faced, including overcoming selfthe difficulties doubt and balancing work with further education. Despite these obstacles, Attorney Phakedi's ascent to an Actina Judge exemplifies dedication personal and to professional growth. These reflections underscore the importance of resilience, self-belief, and mutual support among women. We are urged to push forward with confidence and pride achievements, advocating for continuous personal and professional development means to overcome barriers and achieve leadership roles.





Attorney Connie Phakedi

A key theme in Attorney Phakedi's message is that leadership and empowerment begin with utilizing available resources and asserting oneself in maledominated rather than waiting spaces, opportunities to arise. She addresses the slow pace of transformation within South Africa's legal profession, where Black women often find themselves competing against minority groups for positions. Attorney Phakedi advised against viewing gender as a limitation, advocating instead for women to compete equally with men and be recognized for capabilities, rather than gender.

Attorney Phakedi lauds Chief Justice Mandisa Maya, a leading South African jurist who is the country's first female Chief Justice since 1 September 2024. Chief Justice Maya's pioneering achievements include being the first Black woman to serve on the Supreme Court of Appeal and our appellate court's first Black woman deputy president and president. Chief Justice Maya's consistent leadership and ground-breaking achievements serve as an inspiration for women and aspiring lawyers. Attorney Phakedi emphasizes that Chief Justice Maya's journey illustrates that leadership begins long before reaching the highest ranks, with the importance of starting to lead with the resources at hand and striving for excellence. Chief Justice Maya's achievements are a testament to her unwavering commitment to advancing gender equality in the judiciary and provide a powerful example of how perseverance and dedication can reshape professional landscapes.

Advocate Ayesha Tiry

Ubuntu

Advocate Ayesha Tiry, seasoned advocate and SABWiL Founder, brings a profound perspective to the discussion by highlighting the critical role of women in legal advocacy and leadership. Advocate Tiry celebrates the milestones pioneering women like Chief Justice Maya, using the analogy of rocks cascading down a cliff to illustrate how individual achievements and collective action drive significant and unstoppable change. Advocate Tiry lauds *Ubuntu*, an African philosophy interconnectedness and humanity, underscoring its role in shaping South African law. Adv. Tiry advocates for the explicit inclusion of Ubuntu in the Constitution, reflecting its essential contribution to fostering a more equitable legal framework that embodies values of humanity and dignity.

Advocate Tiry honours late Justice Yvonne Mokgoro, reflecting on Constitutional Court Justice Mokgoro's elevation as South Africa's first Black woman judge in the Constitutional Court. Esteemed Justice Mokgoro's experience under apartheid profoundly influenced judicial philosophy, leading the late Mbokodo to champion *Ubuntu* as a core constitutional value. Advocate Tiry highlights the late Justice Mokgoro's impact through landmark rulings, such as the abolition of the death penalty in *S v Makwanyane*, showcasing how Mbokodo Justice Mokgoro is part of the infusion of African philosophy into our nation's legal system. Advocate Tiry's tribute underscores Justice Mokgoro's legacy of ensuring that the law reflects the lived experiences and values of all South Africans, particularly those historically marginalized, and emphasized the continued relevance and potential of *Ubuntu* in contemporary legal contexts.

Advocate Tiry highlights a pivotal moment when South Africa's President of the Supreme Court of Appeal, appointed 1 June 2023, the erudite Justice Molemela, and the visionary Constitutional Court Justice Mhlanlha, represent our judiciary at monumental meeting of African women judges in Gabon. This historic gathering led to the Libreville Declaration, a strategic document addressing the challenges faced by women in the judiciary across the continent. Advocate Tiry lauds the dedication of the judiciary to overcoming obstacles and emphasizes that even at the peak, the judiciary continues to work collaboratively to lift those still striving and promote gender equality within the legal system fostering constitutional values.
